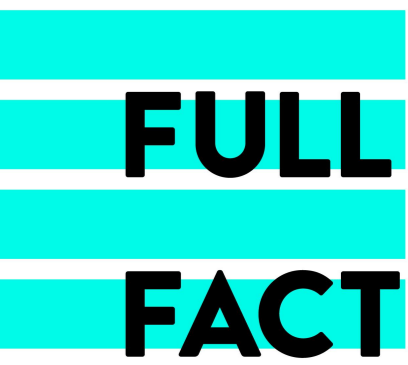


Searching News Media for Repeated Claims

Bad information ruins lives

Fact checkers investigate misleading claims and write explanatory articles

If a misleading claim is repeated we can re-use the article quickly to maximise its impact

How do we do it?

Each day, we compare 100,000 sentences from the media with recent checked claims

We extract features using SentenceBERT, BM25 and entity recognition

A trained neural net (MLP) predicts the probability of a matching claim

A match means that two claims have the same underlying truth conditions

Take action

Our Digest Tool shows new matched claims every day

This allows us to take action quickly by asking for corrections or retractions from politicians and newspapers

Crowdsource training data

Our supporters labelled 1000's of possible pairs of claims

We retrained our model and improved the precision

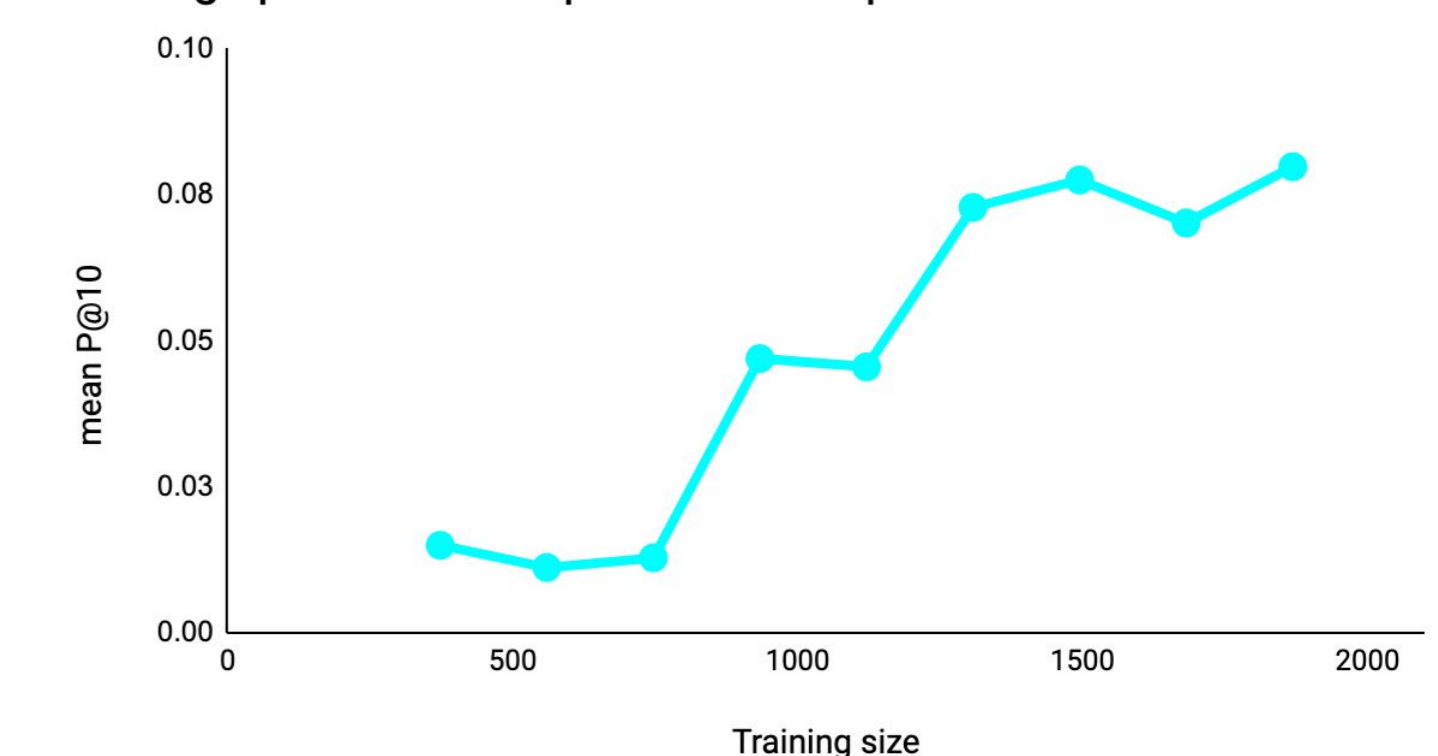
Do these statements mean the same thing?

If so, click yes. If not, click no. And if you're not sure—it's okay to skip.

Claim A
Deaths among children between September to October may have been caused by myocarditis or pericarditis (inflammatory heart conditions which have been reported as a side effect of vaccination).

Claim B
There have been extremely rare cases of myocarditis – an inflammation of the heart muscle – appearing in teenagers as a side-effect of the vaccine.
